

LID Benefits

- Steady source of funding
- Good for programs that all property owners benefit from
- Relatively low cost per property owner
- Direct Tax tax money goes directly to your own lake
- Organized and authorized action agency should an environmental crisis arise




Education



Where We Are

- O Four connected lakes in Otter Tail County, just south of Detroit Lakes, MN
- 45 minutes East of Fargo, ND
- About 180 miles Northwest of Minneapolis





Who We Are


- Formed in 1994 by concerned citizens
- Formed to identify, quantify, study, and manage water resources to preserve their quality
- Lake Improvement District
 - Taxing entity through the county
 - 9 elected volunteer Board Members
 - O Approximately 1,200 property owners with an estimated taxable market value >\$200 million dollars
 - O Boundaries encompass all parcels located within 500 feet of the ordinary high water mark (except agricultural parcels)



Annual Budget

- O Board Members set the annual levy at an annual meeting of membership in August
- Current total levy = \$130,000
- On average \$110 per property owner in the LID

- O PGOLID administers a seasonal Mosquito Control Program
 - Weekly Treatment of Lake Perimeter (36.5 miles)
 - Memorial Day to Labor Day, special treatment July 4th
 - O Minimize spread of disease for people and animals

 - O AEDs











- O PGOLID implements a **Septic System Maintenance** program
- We communicate with the county and have records of the ages of all the septic systems around the lake
- We provide education about septic system maintenance to lake residents and encourage those with older systems to get inspections








- O PGOLID implements a Water Quality Monitoring Program annually
 - Lake and inlets/outlet
 - Tracking trends
 - Investigate problems
 - O Shares data and collaborates on research











- O Curly-leaf pondweed was discovered during an aquatic plant survey in 2003
- In 2005 we began a Curly-leaf pondweed treatment program
- Currently down to treating approximately 30 acres/year @ \$20,000
- Provided data to U of MN study of ongoing treatment




- O PGOLID was infested with Zebra Mussels in 2009
- At this time, not a lot was known about their densities and distribution in MN
- O PGOLID monitored veliger densities and shared the data with the DNR and U of MN
- We now know that veligers peak between the end of June and early July
- Other times of year the densities are quite low







Pelican Lake Veliger Density Patterns







- O From 2009-2015 we had a **Shoreline Restoration** program
- We applied for grants through the DNR Shoreline Habitat Program
 - O In 2009: \$25,000 grant; 6 properties were completed
 - In 2011: \$21,500 grant; 7 projects were completed
 - In 2013: \$20,000 grant; 2 projects were completed












- O In 2016 we started a Tree Planting Program addressing deforestation
- O Property owners can purchase trees for \$15 each (3-4 ft tall) subsidized by PGOLID
- The cost includes delivery and planting of the trees
 - 2016 = 50 trees planted
 - 2017 = 34 trees planted
 - 2018 = 50 trees planned








- O The Fish Lake Dam, located at PGOLID's outlet is in disrepair
- Numerous washouts and patches plague the structure
- Partnered with DNR, US Fisheries and other groups/agencies









- In 2016, PGOLID wrote a successful DNR Conservation Legacy Partners Grant to install rock arch rapids
- Project Partners
 - O Houston Engineering: Project Design
 - O DNR: \$305,255 CPL Grant and Project Oversight
 - O USFWS: \$98,000 Fish Passage Program Grant
 - Lake Association: \$1,000 Donation
 - O FM Muskies: \$1,000 Donation
 - O Red River Sportsmen \$1,500 Donation
 - O PGOLID: Coordinator wrote grant and Project Oversight
 - Formed a Community Advisory Board with key stakeholders
- Construction began in February 2018









- In 2011, Pelican Lake earned Star Certification
- This was a joint application between PGOLID and PLPOA
- To attain a Star Lake or Star River designation, a lake or river association must, at a minimum:
 - O lake or river management plan
 - membership of at least 50% of private shoreland owners
 - water quality monitoring program meeting MPCA standards
 - meet at least annually

- PGOLID Contracts with RMB Labs to provide a Lake Coordinator
- The Lake Coordinator coordinates:
 - water quality monitoring and data assessment
 - invasive species monitoring
 - septic system projects
 - o maintains and updates the Lake Management Plan
 - writes grants
 - attends all board meetings
 - website maintenance
 - conducts education for PGOLID members
 - Provides continuity through board changes
